### Year Four - Malala Class


For anti-bullying week, Malala Class have been discussing what it means to be a friend, and some of the ways we can be a good friend in school. We thought about which kind things were easiest to remember to do and which were sometimes trickier!



## Year Five - Kadeena Cox Class

As part of Anti-Bullying Week, we took part in an activity that was a great illustration of the consequences of bullying. The children took a piece of paper, crumpled it up, stamped on it and screwed it up without tearing it. They then carefully opened the paper and tried to get rid of all of the creases to put it back as it was.

The message: Even though you may have said sorry and you tried to fix things after bullying, the scars are still there. They are there forever and will not go away.



## **Year Six - Sir Captain Tom Moore Class**

In Year 6, we have been thinking about long term effects of bullying. We screwed up a piece of paper and then tried to uncrumple it, to flatten it out to its original state. We found that this was impossible.

We discussed how this symbolised somebody being bullied; that sometimes, even if somebody apologises for bullying, the effects are felt long after.
